## CINDERELLA EATS RICE AND BEANS: A Salsa Fairytale

#### **SONG: FAIRY TALE OPENING**

NARRATOR (voiceover, stuffy, standard).

Once upon a time, in a land right about there
There was a young girl from Puerto Rico named
Cenicienta: Cinderella—

(ENTER CINDERELLA, prim and proper, with a broom.)

#### CINDERELLA. LA LA LA LA LA

NARRATOR. Once upon a time, in a land right about here, there was a young girl from the United States named Rosa—

(ENTER ROSA, with attitude and perhaps a basketball.)

#### ROSA.

YO YO YO YO YO

NARRATOR. Destiny had placed these girls in different parts of the world...with different languages and cus-

toms. Neither girl knew it, but one person would change their lives forever.

ROSA. Forever? CINDERELLA. Para siempre?

(The girls EXIT or freeze in tableau.)

NARRATOR. That super-dooper magical force, of course, is the wonderful, the marvelous, the beautiful FAIRY GODMOTHER!!!

(Searching spotlight. Applause. PADRINO, in a bathrobe, is caught in the spotlight. He's eating something.)

Wait a minute! (MUSIC screeches to a halt.) Where's the fairy godmother?

PADRINO. Oh, she's out of town. At a spa, with some other fairy godmothers. She works so hard, she needed to relax. Soy su marido.

NARRATOR. Her what?

PADRINO. I'm her husband. The Almost Fairy Godfather. El Padrino.

NARRATOR. But we need her for the story! We left messages!

PADRINO. Messages! (He looks through his pockets and pulls out crumpled pieces of paper. Reads.) No, that's the cable bill. "Remember to feed the cat." I think I did that. Oh, lookey here—I wrote this—"Fairy Godmother: Somebody called to make sure you are there for the Cinderella story." Caramba! I guess I forgot to tell her!

- NARRATOR. What??? The story has already started and Cenicienta is traveling from Puerto Rico to Pumpkin Grove Elementary (or Middle) School in the United States right now! Oh no!
- PADRINO. OK! OK! I'll call her! (*Beat.*) No! This is her first vacation in years! I can't mess that up.
- NARRATOR. We need a fairy godmother!
- PADRINO (pause). OK—I'll go. I can do that. I can smooth things over, keep the fort down, tend the farm... What am I supposed to do?
- NARRATOR. You know! Transform. Make things better. Shoes! Don't you know the Cinderella story?
- PADRINO (unsure). Of course I do... (A Disney Cinderella book plops out of the sky.) Ah—
- NARRATOR. Do you know magic?
- PADRINO. Me? A little bit. See my tiny little wings? I haven't passed my fairy godfather test. But don't worry...
- NARRATOR (worried). Oooh!
- PADRINO. —Let me just get my stuff together. Disguises! Doritos! My magic remote. What else could I need? (Another book drops down. The PADRINO looks at it.) "Fairy Godparenting for Dummies: a reference for the rest of us."
- NARRATOR. Maybe we should call your wife and—
- PADRINO. No! Everything is under control. Bajo control. (Begin MUSIC.) Just don't worry my wife. I know exactly what I'm doing (flings the Dummy book away. Regrets it for a second) ...kinda sorta.

#### **SONG: YA VINO EL PADRINO**

#### PADRINO.

YA VINO EL PADRINO
FAIRY GODFATHER IN TOWN
YA VINO EL PADRINO
HERE TO TURN YOUR STORY AROUND
YA VINO EL PADRINO

ROSA (to herself). Imagine the ball. Dribble. Dribble. Pivot. Shoot. And the crowd goes wild! Rosa Perez is awesome...again!

JOEY. Hey, Rosa, what's up?

ROSA. Just being a legend in my own time in my own mind. What's up?

JOEY. For sixth period, Mr. Dinkledoodle is sick today! You know what that means!

ROSA & JOEY (high-fives). Substitute!!!

JOEY. And I hear we have a new kid in our class! A girl that only speaks Spanish!

ROSA. A sub *and* a new kid? Wow—we are going to have fun!

PADRINO. That new kid must be Cinderella. She must be the one I need to help! I know, I'll disguise myself as one of these powerful substitute teachers and go to her class.

(PADRINO begins to dress as a substitute teacher. His cell phone rings. The real world freezes.)

I hate it when that happens at a performance! (He answers in mid-silly disguise.) Mami? Good! Mud bath! Sounds relaxing! Me? Nothing! Just thinking of feeding the cat. I sound funny? 'Cause I'm a funny guy. Of course I'd let you know if there's a problem. Yo te quiero muchisimo. No, yo, te quiero mas. Adios.

(PADRINO hangs up. JOEY and ROSA unfreeze. We are in the classroom. PADRINO pretends to be the substitute teacher.)

All right class...settle down... Your regular teacher, Mr. Dinkledoodle, is sick...and I will be your substitute teacher. Before we talk about the homework. I would like to introduce to you...

(ENTER CINDERELLA wearing flowers in her hair and a simple yet folkloric top and shorts.)

...The fairest of them all: the smart, the beautiful, the wonderful, and very kind Cenicienta.

CINDERELLA. Hola.

JOEY. Ceni-what?

ROSA. Cinderella is Cenicienta in English. Can you believe it? Her name is Cinderella!!

(Laughter.)

PADRINO. She is an exchange student from Puerto Rico. ROSA. Can we exchange her back if we have a receipt?

(JOEY and ROSA high-five each other.)

PADRINO (to ROSA). And you are?

(JOEY stands and begins to cheer.)

JOEY. That's Rosa! (To the audience.)

GIMME AN R! (R)

GIMME AN O! (O)

GIMME AN S! (S)

GIMME AN A! (A)

WHAT'S THAT SPELL?
ROSA!!
Everybody knows who she is. (*Begin MUSIC*.)

ROSA. Everyone knows who I am.
