In the quiet and conservative little town of Decent, Oklahoma, a high-school senior boy named Chives starts rocking the pedestal by running for prom queen. Flamboyant and in-your-face, Chives is determined to bring Decent into the new millennium no matter how many people he upsets. His antics are so outrageous that even his best friend. Maddy Murphy, the most likeable girl on campus, is having trouble sticking by him. When Maddy argues that people are angry with Chives not because he's gay but because he's obnoxiously and provocatively gay, Chives calls her naïve and bets that if the All-American-Girl Maddy were gay, no one would like her either. It's a challenge she can't refuse, and the game is on. What follows is a comedic roller-coaster ride of tap-dancing ranchers, Helen BeGenerous leading a gospel choir, and a potent test of the power of gay-dar. The result is not at all what Maddy is expecting from her town, her friends or herself. What she and Chives learn is a lesson filled with pain, joy and the realization that, despite all the challenges of adolescence, it really does get better. Area staging. 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ACT I

SCENE 1

AT RISE. The stage is decorated like a town square (Decent Town Square) filled with townspeople, students, teachers and CHEERLEADERS. On C stands MAYOR PEPPERCORN, just in front of the HIGH SCHOOL CHOIR, dressed in choir outfits.

(#1: "Opening")

MAYOR & CHOIR (to "America the Beautiful").

IF YOU YEARN FOR SPACIOUS SKIES
AND AMBER WAVES OF GRAIN,
THEN YOU SHOULD TAKE THE INTERSTATE
ACROSS THE FRUITED PLANE,
TO DECENT, OKLAHOMA,
WHERE WE'RE SO RED, WHITE AND BLUE,
THAT WE STILL HAVE HOPE AND ANTELOPE
WAITING JUST FOR YOU.
OH, DECENT, OKLAHOM-MA-MA,
GOD SHED HIS GRACE ON US
AND IF WE HAD TO GRADE OURSELVES,
(CHEERLEADERS form an A+ pyramid.)
WE'D GET A BIG A PLUS!
AH!

MAYOR. Hello everyone! (Cheer from the crowd.) Let me, your beloved mayor, Bernard H. Peppercorn, welcome you all to this year's celebration of Heritage Days. Thank you for joining us in paying tribute to the glorious history of our very special town, Decent, Oklahoma. (Loud applause. Big cheer.) I've

asked Colonel Oliver Oldkopf, platoon leader of the Decent, Oklahoma, chapter of the Ranchers for Righteousness, to deliver the invocation. Colonel?

(COLONEL OLIVER OLDKOPF joining MAYOR at C.)

OLDKOPF. Thank you, Mayor. Will you all bow your heads, please? (A la the voice in a movie trailer.) In a world filled with darkness, one town stands alone against the forces of evil. (A beat. Another movie trailer—even more dramatic.) In a time filled with uncertainty, one town remains unmoved. (Another, even more dramatic trailer.) In a land before time, one town towers above the rest. Give us the strength to carry out our mission—to protect our shores, to defend our liberty and to defeat the Taliban should they cross state lines. Now, more than ever, we are the few, the strong, the proud—and the decent.

(Gigantic cheer.)

MAYOR. Now, let me introduce this afternoon's soloist, who will be leading our anthem. Ladies and gentlemen, the president of the Decent High School Student Council, president of the National Honor Society and chair of this year's prom committee ...

(#2: "Look Out Across America")

MAYOR (cont'd). Miss Madison Murphy!

(Another cheer. MADDY MURPHY joins MAYOR and OLDKOPF at C.)

MADDY.

LOOK OUT ACROSS AMERICA, I THINK THAT YOU WILL SEE, THE USA IS NOT THE KIND OF PLACE IT USED TO BE.
WHILE OTHER TOWNS KEEP STRAYING
FAR FROM THE GOOD OLD DAYS,
IN DECENT, PEOPLE NEVER, EVER CHANGE THEIR WAYS.

(Crowd cheers.)

I DON'T KNOW HOW WE DO IT.
THERE'S SOMETHING SPECIAL TO IT.
I GUESS WE'RE JUST THE TOWN THAT SETS THE BAR,
BECAUSE WE'RE SLIGHTLY MORE AMERICAN THAN
OTHER PEOPLE ARE.

CHOIR & TOWNSPEOPLE (big cheer). BECAUSE WE'RE SLIGHTLY MORE AMERICAN THAN OTHER PEOPLE ARE.

ALL

WE'RE SO AMERICAN, WE'RE SO AMERICAN, SOMETIMES WE LIKE TO BURST RIGHT OUT IN SONG. IT'S NOT THAT WE'RE SO BRIGHT, OR EVEN THAT WE'RE RIGHT, IT'S JUST THAT OTHER PEOPLE ARE SO WRONG.

MADDY.

CHOIR. TOWNSPEOPLE & MADDY.

WE'RE SO AMERICAN, WE'RE SO AMERICAN, IT'S AMAZING HOW MUCH LOYALTY WE'VE GOT. WE BEAR OUR ARMS OF STEEL, WE PLEDGE ALLIEGIANCE WITH MORE ZEAL. OTHERS THINK THEIR EQUAL, BUT THEY'RE NOT.

MADDY.

LOOK OUT ACROSS AMERICA, I THINK THAT YOU WILL SEE, WHEN IT COMES TO BEING DECENT, WE DO IT PERFECTLY.

IT'S HARD TO BE THIS SHINING STAR IN A TOWN THAT'S SO QUIXOTIC, BUT IN DECENT PEOPLE ARE SO GOSH DARN PATRIOTIC.

CHOIR, TOWNSPEOPLE & MADDY.

PATRIOTIC!
THAT'S WHY WE'RE SO AMERICAN,
SO OVERFLOWINGLY AMERICAN.

(Lights down, curtain down.)

(#2a: "Look Out Across America" [Tag])

SCENE 2

(In the blackout, a classroom bell RINGS. The voice of PRINCIPAL MASON comes on over a loudspeaker or an intercom.)

PRINCIPAL MASON V.O. Good morning, Decent High School! This is Principal Mason with today's announcements. Congratulations to the Decent High Debate Team for their victory over Perry High School in Texas this weekend. Well done. Wrestling practice has been canceled for the foreseeable future. It will resume as soon as Coach Schneider's fungal infection clears up.

(Curtain up as students are on their way to class at Decent High School. MADDY is distributing flyers to students as they pass her in groups entering from R. She's bright and cheery and the other kids clearly like her.)

- PRINCIPAL MASON V.O. (cont'd). And don't forget that this year's Dream Song Competition is coming up. Be sure to get your audition numbers ready! Have a great day, everybody!
- MADDY. Dream Song Competition sign ups at 3 o'clock. (Says this to each group that passes as they take flyers.)

(As this is taking place, CHIVES JOHNSON enters and watches her from the sidelines, shaking his head and rolling his eyes.)

- CHIVES (when the other students disappear, as another bell RINGS). Well, aren't you the cat's meow!
- MADDY. I hate it when you wear that boa. It brings out the worst in you. (*Turns to go to class.*)

- CHIVES. Really, I thought it brought out the blue in my eyes. Just wanted to say what a spectacularly idiotic performance you gave at Heritage Days. (*This stops MADDY in her tracks.*) Are you competing for the American Airhead Awards now, too?
- MADDY (turns and looks back at him, annoyed). I'm not interested in your commentary, Chives.
- CHIVES. I don't know how you take these people seriously, Maddy. "Decent, Oklahoma, the little town that never changes." Please!
- MADDY. It's just an annual celebration, Chives.
- CHIVES. It's nonsense. These people are living in a time warp. When are they going to wake up and smell the social progress? MADDY. It's a tradition. It isn't personal.
- CHIVES. Everything's personal, Maddy. Especially tradition. I think the entire event was an insult to gay people.
- MADDY. Gay people? Who said anything about gay people?
- CHIVES. My point exactly. Some days, I feel as if I don't exist in this town. (Beat, as he assesses the situation.) I used to think my friends had principles.
- MADDY. You don't have any friends.
- CHIVES. Very unkind.
- MADDY. OK, you have me. But how can you say I don't have principles?
- CHIVES. Because you stand up and say things you don't believe so that people—these people—will like you.
- MADDY. What's wrong with wanting people to like me?
- CHIVES. It's unprincipled. And it's also boring. Someone should tell these people how ridiculous they are.
- MADDY. It seems to me you do that on a regular basis.
- CHIVES. Because I'm principled. (Beat, with grave seriousness.) And do you know what one, singular truth I hold to be self-evident?
- MADDY. I can't imagine.

CHIVES. To thine own self be true. Authenticity, Maddy. Do you know what authenticity is?

MADDY. Wearing a boa and impersonating Lady Gaga? Look, I'm late for class.

(MADDY starts to leave, but what CHIVES says draws her back.)

CHIVES. Authenticity is not caring what people think about me. I don't need the approval of others. Which is why I boycotted today's festivities. And you should have done the same. Instead, you were the star—as you always are.

MADDY. And you want me to apologize for that?

CHIVES. I want you to stand up for what you think!

MADDY. Look, Chives, we're in high school. Nobody cares what we think. In fact, most people in high school don't really "think" anything. We're just trying to get through senior year without making fools of ourselves.

CHIVES. Is that really your goal, Maddy?

MADDY. Absolutely.

(#3: "It Works for Me")

CHIVES. You disappoint me. Deeply.

MADDY. I know. Still, if your best—and only—friend is a people pleaser, you could at least be proud that she's very, very good at it.

I CAN BE ANYTHING, I MEAN ANYTHING,

THAT I NEED TO BE.

THAT'S HOW I GET BY IN HIGH SCHOOL.

IT WORKS, IT WORKS FOR ME.

I GO WITH NICENESS, WITH DON'T ASK TWICENESS.

IT WORKS, IT WORKS FOR ME.

CHIVES (sarcastically).

YOU'RE SO AGREEABLE, SO DON'T MIND ME-ABLE.

MADDY.

THAT'S WHAT I LIKE TO BE.

CHIVES.

THAT'S HOW YOU GET BY IN HIGH SCHOOL.

MADDY.

IT WORKS, IT WORKS FOR ME.

(As students walk by, MADDY hands them a flyer.)

Dream Song Competition at 3 o'clock. Here you go.

THIS IS MY PERSONA.

THIS IS WHO I CHOOSE TO BE.

YOU MAY THINK IT'S CRAZY,

YOU MAY THINK IT'S CRAZY,

YOU MAY THINK IT'S CRAZY,

BUT IT WORKS, IT WORKS FOR ME.

CHIVES.

I'VE JUST GOTTA BE MYSELF, I JUMP OFF THE SHELF AND I'M FLYING FREE. THAT'S HOW I GET BY IN HIGH SCHOOL. IT WORKS, IT WORKS FOR ME. A LITTLE FLAGRANT,

MADDY. No kidding!

CHIVES.

A LITTLE BLATANT,

MADDY. There's an understatement.

CHIVES.

NOW THAT'S WHAT WORKS FOR ME.

MADDY.

YOU'RE JUST ANNOYING, BUZZ-KILL DESTROYING.

CHIVES.

THAT'S WHAT I LIKE TO BE.
THAT'S HOW I SUCCEED IN HIGH SCHOOL.
IT WORKS, JUST LOOK AT ME.

(As the music plays under CHIVES, CHIVES' BACKUP DANCERS dressed a la Beyoncé enter. CHIVES dances with them. It's a stunning performance. As the dance continues, he talks to them, ad-libbing with something appropriate, such as, "Stay with me, girls," "Move those hips," etc. The song ends with a dramatic finish and CHIVES and his dancers hold the pose.)

MADDY. What was that?

CHIVES. I thought we were bursting into song.

MADDY. It's a musical. We're supposed to burst into song.

CHIVES. Well, I never sing without backup dancers. Don't worry. They're only a figment of my imagination.

MADDY. Why don't I have backup dancers?

CHIVES. Because you have no imagination.

MADDY. But—

CHIVES. No, Maddy. That is the reality of the situation. *I* have an imagination. You don't. Live with it.

(#3a: "It Works for Me" [Part 2])

CHIVES (cont'd).

UH, UH, UH, UH, THIS IS MY PERSONA, IT'S WHO I'M MEANT TO BE. YOU MAY THINK IT'S CRAZY, BUT IT WORKS FOR ME. YOU MAY THINK IT'S CRAZY, BUT IT WORKS FOR ME. MADDY. CHIVES.

(MADDY exits. CHIVES shakes his head.)

(#3b: "It Works for Me" [Reprise])

CHIVES.

IT'S ONLY HIGH SCHOOL. AND HIGH SCHOOL'S MADNESS. I CAN'T WAIT UNTIL IT'S DONE. BUT BEFORE IT'S OVER, WHY NOT FLAUNT SOME BADNESS? YOU KNOW, IT'S ONLY HIGH SCHOOL, BUT I THINK I'LL HAVE SOME FUN!
